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
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L&M TRAVELOGUE: CHINA



Earlier this spring we had the opportunity to visit China to meet with both existing and potential customers. We either flew through or stayed in Shanghai, Nanjng, Changsha, Xiangtan, Bautou and Beijing.

Xiangtan was our first extended stay city. We are not sure how many foreign visitors get to Xiangtan, but based on the looks we would get while out walking, or out for meals, our conclusion was not many. During our four-day stay there we only saw one other Westerner. The people were very friendly. Full of curiosity and beaming with excitement, young children out with their parents would approach us and say hello, while their parents watched and smiled. Just as quickly they would dart back to their parents.

Street traffic was crazy in both Xiangtan and Beijing. Crossing the street was at times like playing 'Frogger', only in real life. Ok - we just dated ourselves. We also noticed that Audi and Volkswagen seemed to be popular car makes. It seems that poor air quality in Beijing continues to be in the international news, but our day there was beautiful – clear blue sky.

Bautou, Inner Mongolia, was a very interesting city. A lot of green - many parks along with tree lined streets. Bautou is Mongolian for 'place where deer live' and is home to the largest inner city park in China – Saihantala Grassland (5.65 square kilometers). A small herd of captive deer live within the park. Our hosts took us to a traditional Mongolian hot pot dinner thinly sliced raw beef and lamb along with vegetables served family style on a large lazy Susan in the center of the table. You drop the raw food into a boiling soup broth to cook. It was an

Our hosts also explained that some of the industry in Bautou was initiated in the 1950s as a joint venture between what was the Soviet Union and Chinese – tank and missile manufacturing. Evidently these facilities are still active.

We were not sure what to expect in China, but it was much more consumer commercialized than anticipated. Very nice shopping plazas with department and specialty stores along with food courts and restaurants very similar to shopping malls here in the U.S. Cell phones were everywhere! Looking forward to a return visit.

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
